
Judgment To Come Upon The Rich

James now uses his final words of this letter to encourage his readers. Many were under persecution and finding life very hard. The final part of his letter was therefore designed to finish with an encouraging high.

To help encourage the believers, James begins this chapter speaking to the rich men who were oppressing them (compare to James 2:6).

Sometimes we struggle when the wicked seem to be blessed. So many people who hate God are successful and happy... but they have their reward now, and only now. Take the time to read the words of the Psalmist in Psalm 73:1-19 – James is encouraging the believers in the same way: to remember that God is in control.

How does God see the rich and their possessions? Use the table to show the contrast in verses 1-6.



Is James 5 contradicting James 3?

- If we ask for God's wisdom in trial (Ch 1) then God will give it! God's Judgement is JUST!

James 5 "Last Days" = AD70

- "Ye rich men" CR 2v6 & Luke 16v19-25 = Jewish Leaders
- "Weep" CR <u>Luke 23v28-30</u> = Daughters of Jerusalem
- "Howl" Used by prophets (Joel 1) = Divine Judgment
- "Coming upon you" Luke 21v26 = "Soon be upon you" WT
- "Garment" "And let him that is in the field not turn back again for to take up his garment" (Mark 13v16)
- "Witness" <u>Luke 21v13</u> "Turn to you as a <u>testimony</u>"
- "Fire" "But when the king heard thereof, he was wroth: and he sent forth his armies, and destroyed those murderers, and burned up their city" (Matt 22v7). CR LORD OF SABAOTH
- "Coming of the Lord" = GK "Parousia" (Matt 24) Presence
- "Husbandmen" = Matt 21v33-44 (Luke 20v9-18)
- "Patience of Job" Matt 24v13 "But he that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved"

"A Witness Against You"

- "These (wicked ones) spoke evil of Christ; and having the power of all hostile to the truth on their side, whether Jew or Gentile, they subjected their Christian fellowcountrymen to a fiery trial. Collectively, the unbelieving Jews were then a formidable and dangerous power; for though they were but foreigners in Anatolia, yet they were ever ready to excite the idolatrous Greeks against those of their own nation who acknowledged the Messiahship of Jesus (Acts 17:5-8, 13). Peter refers to these in the activity of their enmity against Christian Jews, as their diabolos, or opponent-at-law, the seducer, as a roaring lion, who walks about seeking whom he may devour (1 Peter 5:8)."

"The Coming of the Lord Draweth Nigh"

- "In this, Jesus evidently taught, that the Son of man's coming to avenge his servants would be soon; certainly not eighteen hundred years off; for this could not be termed, speedily. History shows it was within forty years; yet, though so soon as this, when his presence was revealed by the encampment of the armies of the Little Horn around Jerusalem, few believed in that appearing; so faithless and apostate had Christian Jews become in the very country where the labours of the Son of Man himself, and of all his apostles, has been so abundant."

"THE Husbandman Waitheth"

- "But the great majority became weary and faint in their minds though they had not resisted as yet unto blood, striving against the sin of apostasy. Iniquity abounding among them, the love of the greater number had waxed cold. Contentions and strifes prevailed among them, with every evil work. It is evident from Peter, James and Jude, that a perfectly antediluvian condition of things prevailed among them; and that, therefore, the fate of the old world, and of Sodom and Gomorrha awaited them. They had been the salt of the fortysecond generation; but they had lost their savour; so that nothing now remained, but that they and it should be cast out, and trodden under foot of the Gentiles. The coming of the Son of Man to take the Kingdom from the evil husbandmen, and to avenge the death of his servants from Abel to the Son of Barachias; was a matter of laughter and scorn."

Verse 4 is so encouraging! Do you ever feel oppressed or alone? Have you ever been in a state when it all feels too hard and there is no one to turn to? James is telling the believers – including us – that there is one who hears.


Reward Comes To The Patient

Verse 7 starts with "Be patient therefore, brethren" referring to the previous verses. As James winds up towards a conclusion it's worth breaking this down. What does it really mean? Compare it with "Be patient" in James 1:3-4.

"Be patient therefore" – why does James say this? This is obviously an extremely difficult task when enduring trial. Look at verse 4 and write down why the believers and us today can use this as encouragement to try to develop patience:

Power of the Tongue? = PRAYER!

"Cries of them...ears of the Lord of Sabaoth"


Heb = Yahweh of armies

"Brethren" - we saw earlier (in chapter 1) how often James uses this expression to encourage and show his love for fellow believers. See how many times he uses it in his closing words.

This is a key phrase throughout James' letter. Hopefully you coloured this in during the background, but if not, do it now!

Patience





Be long spirited. (v7-8)

Fix your eyes on the future glory. "Establish" (v8) = "set his face" (Lk 9v51) because of the "Joy set before him". Forbearance, longsuffering. (v10)

Reward Comes To The Patient

"Grudge Not...swear not"

- Power of the Tongue... (1v26)
 expresses our heart under trial.
- 1v13 "let no man say..."
- Trial often causes us to begrudge others (break 2nd great law)
- Trial can cause us to speak inadvisably with our lips against God, break 1st great law = v12 "Above all"

James tells us not only to be patient but also to "stablish our hearts". Write in your margin next to this "stablish" = to set fast.



Sickness And Healing:

Becoming The "Righteous Man"

Read verses 13-20 again. There would've been many in the ecclesia in James' day that were sick, and these words would have been a great encouragement. Read the passage again and think of it as a spiritual sickness. These same encouraging words provide help for those that are struggling with their faith.

(verse 15) "sick" - "to toil, tire due to work, weariness of mind" (different word in v14)

(verse 15) "save" - used in a spiritual sense "to deliver or protect" compare to James 1:21; 2:14; 4:12; 5:20

The following words now seem to have even more power with regards to how we respond to these things.

A "righteous man" is the person that James has been trying to help us become. "Availeth much" means "strength to overcome." Think about that in relation to all we have looked at the constant struggle with sin, oppression, trials, persecution etc. How encouraging to try to be this kind of person, to pray for ourselves and others!

Responsibility Towards Erring Brethren

KEY TO JAMES!

- Background: 1 Cor 15v7, Acts
 1v14
- James never forgot what he did wrong...and if Christ would go out to save him, then he should do same to everyone! (Matt 18v2-35)
- Defining character of James!!

These last two verses speak of those who "err" from the Truth. James chooses to end his letter with these words: we must then pay attention! The last two verses sum up exactly what James was doing by writing the letter, trying to help "save as many souls from death" as he possibly could.

This is of the utmost relevance to us today; all of us know of a young person or friend who no longer comes to the meeting, or who attend the meeting but live a different life away from it. James tells us that we cannot stand by and just watch!

When someone begins to wander we can tend to think, "they'll sort themselves out" or "someone else will call them". It can be a hard thing to do, but we are required to work with

Gal 6:1, 9-10

Jude :22-23





James says that in showing someone the error of their ways, however hard this might be, this will save them from death and 'hide a multitude of sins'. Thier sins are not 'hidden' by themselves, but they are covered by Christ through repentance and forgiveness. Need we any greater motivation?

OUR RESPONSIBILITY SAVING THOSE WHO ERR

The Chapter 5 Challenge:

Get a group of two or three of your friends, and PRACTISE true religion:

- *Grudge not one against another* do you hold a grudge against someone? We might hold these forever if we don't do something now. James is clear - we will be condemned! (5:9) Identify a grudge you have with someone and take action; discuss, forgive, forget.
- > This month, take up the prayer challenge. Get into the habit of praying morning and night. In these prayers, make sure you remember people who are sick, or struggling with their faith.
- > Identify a young person that has dropped off the radar or stopped attending meetings. Ring or SMS them and try to restore contact. Invite them out for a coffee, or shout them a kebab. Try to encourage them to come to the next CYC activity. Share your passion for the truth!
